#### **Bishop Luffa Remembers**

he whole school community came together in solemn remembrance on Armistice Day, with students and staff gathered on the field for a service of commemoration, including two minutes



silence at 11am. As well as prayers and thoughts, the short service included wreath laying, and the sounding of 'The Last Post' and 'Reveille' (by Freddie Lynas – 100tter).

After a virtual service last year it was humbling and heartening to see the School come together in person to mark this important event. The conduct of the students was superb, within, and either side of the service. In the build-up to the service, tutor groups had reflected on the meaning of remembrance, and have had the chance to buy poppies. The service ended with Funmi Ajayi (one of our School Captains) dismissing the students by blowing a whistle used in the trenches – the sound of which gave

our students a tangible link to those events over a century ago. Along with the Spitfire that flew overhead, and the birdsong that punctuated the two minute silence, it added to the solemnity, and poignancy, of the event.

As Mr Hindman mentioned within the service, we can only aim to enjoy 'life in all its fullness', partly because of the sacrifice of those we remember on this day.

picture of students and staff having completed the run in our Sports Hall. It was a magnificent way to end the week and a joy to see so many involved and having such a good time.



They provide emergency food parcels for families and individuals in crisis in the Chichester District of West Sussex. ## Sixth Former's EPQ 'Ollie the Octopus' stars at COP26

e are very excited and proud to announce that Elise Pullen's (13Andrewes) Extended Project Qualification artefact has been displayed at COP26 in Glasgow. In order to combat plastic pollution she created an Octopus, later nicknamed Ollie, to raise children's awareness of microplastics on West Wittering beach. She has been awarded an A\* grade.

Elise commented, 'My project asked 'Can I create a sculpture that raises awareness about marine plastic pollution



on West Wittering beach?' with particular reference to 'nurdles', lentil-sized microplastics that are melted down at sea to form almost all plastic products, but resulting in 200,000 tons spilled annually.

Using litter collected from several beach cleans I made a life-size sculpture of an octopus. During my research, I contacted 'The Great Nurdle Hunt', a charity run by 'Fidra' to reduce nurdle pollution through beach cleans or 'hunts', to cite some of their facts and statistics. I ended up sending the sculpture to them in Scotland to use in festivals, and a few days ago they sent an email saying their representatives took him to COP26! They said everyone loved him and they chatted to some interested individuals and international delegates.'

The majority of our Sixth Formers undertake an EPQ in year 12, many writing extended research-based essays and some creating artefacts. A range of universities now give lower alternative offers to applicants with an A or A\* in the EPQ. t the end of November Bishop Luffa hosted its first whole school Careers Fair. Over 40 exhibitors from education, training and employment attended to talk to students about the range of options and pathways available to them. Representatives came from Further Education such as Chichester College and HSDC, top Universities such as Exeter and Bristol, and employers such as Chichester Festival Theatre, Police, Goodwood, the Army, and The Science and Technologies Facilities Council.



Students completed a Careers Fair Bingo sheet which helped them ask relevant questions to our exhibitors - a winner was drawn from each year group and received a prize from Montezuma's. All year groups attended the fair and interacted purposefully and enthusiastically with the exhibitors. There was a real buzz in the Hall and the students got a lot out of the day. #### **Year 8 have fun at the Winchester Science Centre**

n 30<sup>th</sup> November and 1<sup>st</sup> December the whole of Year 8 had the opportunity to visit the Science Centre over at Winchester. Students shared their thoughts on what they enjoyed about the trip,

The trip was a great success and on both days two coaches full of excited students left school after tutor time, returning at 3pm. The trip consisted of a 45

minute excellent Planetarium experience, where the students learnt about constellations, the planets, about our Sun and what a black hole is - a well-presented show aimed at KS3 student's curriculum content.

The Science Centre also had two interactive areas, where students spent half an hour at a time immersing themselves in the exhibits related to STEM topics. One area was specifically for Exploring Space. The other area included science concepts such as Forces, Sound, Environmental issues and the interaction of organisms in various habitats. The exhibits all had a link to future careers in STEM, so

students could see where the science they are learning could lead on to.

The final session included a workshop to build their own bottle rocket in teams, ensuring it had the necessary specifications to go fast and win the final race. The rockets were then launched across the room on strings above using fuel (all fired by the Centre staff!). The students all had a fun filled learning experience and they followed this up back in school with poster designs of their rockets.




#### **Dance Insight Day at University of Chichester**

who really rose to the challenge! The timetable for the day included




It was an enjoyable day and the students really enjoyed finding out about a range of dance pathways and watching live performances again!


