And, in the midst of the 'throng' is 'The Sanctuary', staffed by representatives from the diocese & wider faith communities. The Rev. Sue Wilkinson coordinates the Sanctuary

and explains: "The Sanctuary is a relaxed area staffed by a small team with hot drinks available from our friends at The Salvation Army catering van and a place to rest weary feet. We operate as a safe space for any lost people with the support of the showground personnel. The Sanctuary in its current set-up has been going for six years now but the church has always had a presence at the show from the very beginning. The Show has always been an excellent opportunity for outreach, to both visitors and stall holders. Visiting clergy and Christian leaders come along to help take the Church out into the wider community."

RURAL RESOURCE EVENT: FARM VISIT TO PLUMPTON COLLEGE



Plumpton College, near Lewes, is one of only 13 remaining agricultural colleges in

the country, and offers the broadest curriculum of any college in the south; of the 19 subjects offered, 90% are land-based. Recently a group of clergy and laity experienced at first hand this incredible asset, right on our doorstep!

Since the original 400-acre College farm was bought back in 1919, Plumpton College has certainly seen a lot of changes. Now farming around 2,500 acres in conjunction with several landlords, the outstanding College estate has grown to become one of the leading centres for land-based education in the UK. With a dairy herd of 260 cows, 1,000 sheep, 130 sows, 65

horses and a wide range of other animals and livestock, the College endeavours to provide hands-on practical and vocational academic education. alongside high development, in agriculture, viticulture and horticulture. During the visit the Principal, Jeremy Kerswell, gave a brief history of the College, described



'Plumpton At Present' and outlined the vision for the future. At



the heart of the College's vision is: **PEOPLE - PLACE - PURPOSE;** headings which are also pertinent to rural communities in particular! Being a 'FARM VISIT' a tour followed, viewing some of the livestock, teaching and training spaces, and observing the

latest in agricultural technology, including a robotic milking facility - an example of Plumpton's desire to build on it's rich agricultural heritage while equipping the 4000+ students for a different and ever more technically advanced skills set in the future. In September 2022 Plumpton will welcome an

incredible intake of 1,300 16 & 17 year mainly olds, from across East & West Sussex. The Farm Visit concluded with short act of worship in St Michael's



Church, which is located at the heart of the campus, and a light lunch. All in all, this was an informative and inspiring occasion! Please pray for this great asset, for the students, staff and trustees; also, for the possibility of stronger partnership between the Diocese, Parish and College - watch this space!



Lammastide is an ancient Christian festival which many villages and farming communities have rediscovered in recent years. It is a festival of thanksgiving to God for the start of the harvest, where corn and bread are offered as symbols of gratitude. The name comes from the Old English word for 'loaf', hlāf, which is followed by 'mass', to indicate a Christian festival. Celebrated on (or around) the 1st August Lammastide is an opportunity to celebrate the first fruits of the harvest. Traditionally, a newly baked loaf from the wheat harvest was presented before God within the mass of that day. While the ceremony ceased at the Reformation, reference to Lammas Day continued in the Prayer Book calendar.

During the upheaval of the past two years, both with the impact of covid-19 and the on-going invasion of Ukraine, there has been a renewed appreciation of food and where it comes from. Use of the term 'food security' has become more commonplace, as reflected in the recent 'Government Food Strategy'. Furthermore, increased environmental awareness, and changes in eating habits, is causing many of us to think about how we are fed and, as with other festivals, Lammastide provides a great opportunity for local churches to engage with the wider community, not least to acknowledge God's generous provision and to give thanks.

Therefore, why not bring your local community together, perhaps to enjoy a stint of bread-making, while picking up on some of the 'bread-related' themes we find in the Bible, such as the feeding of the 5,000, the provision of manna in the wilderness or Jesus' claim of Himself as 'the Bread of Life'.
