Welcome to this latest edition of CULTIVATE!

We know that isolation and loneliness are on the increase. Loneliness can have a profound effect on our well-being. In a rural context loneliness can be exacerbated by physical isolation and difficulty accessing services or leisure facilities. As rural churches we have a unique opportunity to respond to social isolation, not least by interacting with our village neighbours and ensuring our church buildings are welcoming and accessible. It is estimated that there are 15,000 rural churches in the UK and often they are the only remaining public building in many rural communities. It could be as simple as opening the doors, putting a kettle on and welcoming people in. Of course, church members often have good links with the wider community and—along with other residents - can be a lifeline to identify and support those with limited mobility. After all, way back in Genesis we are told 'It is not good for man to be alone...'

This edition of *Cultivate* focuses on opportunities to interact with our local communities, and to engage with others in similar rural situations to our own. Rogation is an imminent opportunity to do this, while there are details of other inperson and online (if you have decent internet access) events offering support, encouragement and shared insight.

'Rogation' is an ancient church festival which seeks God's blessing on the local community. This year, Rogation Sunday falls on the 5th May, being the Sixth Sunday of Easter. While celebrated mainly in rural communities, Rogationtide can be adapted in any context, and is a great opportunity for the local Church to serve and reach out to the wider community, not least those who would not ordinarily attend a church service. This is because Rogation Services tend to be outdoors and, therefore, more visible and accessible, and less intimidating than going into an unfamiliar building.

The word rogation comes from the Latin verb *rogare*, meaning "to ask" and involves making supplication to God for protection, to provide and to bless, while acknowledging His goodness and our dependency on Him. A Rogation Service can 'move around' the 'key' locations within a village, town or local farm, and prayers offered accordingly - outside the village school, overlooking livestock or ploughed fields, beside the village pond, hall or local pub, as well as the church. Prayers and readings can involve people of all ages and enable the local church to get alongside those it serves.

The three days immediately after Rogation Sunday, are called 'Rogation Days', leading up to Ascension Day. These three days sometimes involve 'beating the bounds' of a parish and, again, can be used to pray for the well-being of a local community and to ask God's blessing on agriculture and industry particularly. These 'processions', along with the Rogation Service, are a wonderful opportunity to share our hope in God's goodness and to 'tell and show the people of Sussex that God loves them and wants the best for their lives, not just now, but for eternity', as stated in our diocesan vision.

Rogationtide provides us with the opportunity to praise the Creator God, give thanks for our food and those who produce it; to pray a blessing on the villages in which we live and to connect with the wider community. Therefore, let us celebrate in thankfulness for all the Lord's amazing provision.

Running Space : Championing Life, Beating Suicide

Running Space, a charity founded here in East Sussex, uses running as a platform to champion life and beat suicide. Teaching people how to run builds hope, mental and physical health, and strong relationships, saving lives and creating suicide safer communities.

Until recently Running Space operated mainly in urban contexts; however, in partnership with The Pelham (a Christian Charity in Sidley, www.thepelham.co.uk), Ashburnham Church is now hosting Rural Running Space Sessions twice monthly, on Saturday mornings, between 9.30 am and 11 am.

The sessions are free and open to anyone, whatever level of fitness, and include a variety of exercises, as well as running and walking. Overseen by trained coaches Running Space sessions provide a safe, fun, and friendly environment to improve fitness and build relationships. Each session is followed by refreshments (coffee and cake!) in the Church Hall.
